PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

The weather is heating up but that doesn't stop our volunteers. We have been busy with events: the Season Opening, the Car Show, the truck club's Truck Show, the tractor run to the Zillah Community Days parade, the auto club's Swap Meet/Flea Market, Old Town Days and several school tours. We are also in the planning stages for the Pioneer Power Show & Swap Meet / Flea Market, Agri-Copia and the Harrah Fall Festival tractor run. If you, or someone you know would like to be a swap meet vendor at the Pioneer Power Show, you can find the application in this newsletter, on the museum website and on our Facebook page.

In recent weeks, we have been concentrating our efforts on tidying up and improving the museum. The entrance sign on Highway 97 has been refurbished and will be installed soon. The carpets in the office, Grange library and visitor center have all been cleaned along with the chairs in the board room. New gutters have been installed on buildings 7 and 16. If that wasn't enough, we loaded three forty-yard dumpsters with debris that has been collecting over the past forty-five years. Hats off to our volunteers because the grounds are really looking great.

Our next big project is to sort through the many deteriorated, and duplicate artifacts to decide what should be kept and what needs to be deaccessioned. Once that is done the items we can no longer adequately display will be sent to metal recycling.

Jerry, our host with his sidekick Shadow meet and greet our many guests. They also keep the front-end looking very inviting with many interesting shrubs and flowers.

The office staff keeps the bills paid and deals with all the correspondence. They have also been working diligently on sorting through years of incomplete accession records.

The Building 1 crew have been busy on several projects: repairing the farm tunes display, restoring a vintage rocking chair, restoring a 1900's horse drawn surrey and doing some long overdue maintenance on our two trams.

The Farmstead gang has been very busy expanding the area, maintaining and repairing the kiddie train and merry-go-round, and rebuilding the depot. They have some interesting ideas for the future, including Native American artifacts and displays. We are looking forward to this project.

The guys in the Klingele shop have been very busy. They are continuing the restoration on the F & M transfer truck, the John Deere "L" garden tractor and putting the finishing touches on the double seated/double steering wheel Farmall "A" tractor. They also get interrupted occasionally to fix or repair equipment that breaks down.

The Danner building crew have also been busy. Last spring we had a cab fire in our 1946 Ford COE (cab over engine) flatbed truck. It is now about 80% complete for the second time. They also do a great deal of mowing, disking the wheat field and sawing lumber for our use and for demonstrations.

The Central Washington Antique Farm Equipment Club members continue working on their project, a four-cylinder Fairbanks Morse engine. This engine is very large and requires a lot of concrete to stabilize it. The hole has been dug, and the re-bar is being installed. Once the re-bar is in place, they will be ready for phase one of concrete. We are looking forward to seeing this project complete and running.

As you can see our volunteers are the heart and backbone of this museum. I can't thank them enough for their dedication and commitment to this 45-year-old museum. THANK YOU, VOLUNTEERS!

Operations Manager Report by Paul Strater

The City of Union Gap is the owner of the property where the Ag Museum is located. The City does not act as an “absentee landlord,” instead, the mayor, city council members, city manager, and city staff are active partners in the development and operation of the Ag Museum. For instance, Mayor John Hodkinson regularly drives one of the trams during events and field trips. The City has had 3 different city managers in the past several years. Every one of them has attended museum board meetings, event planning sessions, and offered technical advice to keep the Ag Museum on the right legal path. The most recent city manager, Sharon Bounds, has been especially helpful in guiding our board through the process of updating the bylaws, creating a written Personnel Policies Manual and a Volunteer Handbook, clarifying the reason for the documentation of items located on the museum property, and related official operating requirements. She has just retired from the city manager position, but we are recruiting her to be the first member of a new Advisory Council. This group of community representatives will meet two or three times a year to share their knowledge and make suggestions to the Museum Board of Directors.

The board of directors felt strongly that the Ag Museum needed to do a better job of visually documenting and sharing the events held at the museum. After exploring several options, the board decided to contract with Dave Poling to take video footage of major events at the museum, both drone and ground-level and then edit the footage into short videos that can be shared at presentations on and off the museum grounds. The quality of the videos produced so far has been outstanding.

The previous method of showing a video at the visitor center involved connecting a video player to a projector on the ceiling and showing it on a pull-down screen. The image quality was not the greatest and the audio sound relied on separate speaker equipment. A volunteer, Mark Congleton, who is also a board member, donated a large screen television that is mounted on the west wall of the meeting room. The picture and sound quality are dramatically improved. We show the past—but we use the technology of today.

Education Coordinator Report by Cheryl Reese

We had 7 field trips this spring and hosted over 400 students. In 2024, we received a Yakama Cares grant from the Yakama Nation Legends Casino Hotel. Thanks to this funding, every student that participated in a field trip went home with a backpack that featured the CWAM logo and contained educational materials as well as a schedule of events so families will know about all the exciting things happening at the museum and can plan a return trip! We had a fun new addition to our field trip experience this year – Prater Farms generously donated their time and brought a petting zoo complete with rabbits, goats, peacocks, and an emu to every field trip this year, enhancing the experience for kids and adults alike. In addition to the guided school field trips, several more student groups came and participated in self-guided activities at the museum.

The Olde Yakima Letterpress Museum will be open and there will be food vendors onsite both days.

Continued from the last newsletter

This text is from an undated, unsigned, handwritten document found in our files. We believe it was written by Bob Eschbach, one of the founders of the museum. It has been typed exactly as written with only abbreviations expanded, and the spelling of names corrected. When there is a question mark in this document it was in the original. Grammar and missing words have not been corrected. Museum history documents often contradict each other.

- 2-1-83 Discussed name change from Union Gap Agricultural Museum Association to Central Washington Agricultural Museum
- 4-5-83 Name officially changed
- 5-3-83 Boise Cascade offered Orr's steam engine. (Was in Naches box factory during WW II)
- 7-5-83 Kiwanis Club of Union Gap grant for electrical service in shop building
- 3-6-84 Olga and Lloyd Cline donated 1/2 the amount to build 2nd building
- 4-84 2nd. building "Cline" completed
- 5-1-84 Tieton canal section brought to museum
- 9-4-84 Hank and Emma Neumeister offered to get windmill (40 foot) and put it over a 1000-gallon tank. Later they drilled a well.
- 10-15-84 Neumeisters purchased the windmill in Rosalia, WA
- 11-19-84 Francis Feser began construction of a shelter over Boise-Cascade display. City budgeted costs of rest room.
- 12-4-84 Del and Dorothy Zirkle's 50th anniversary.
- 4-2-85 ?? 3rd. building completed (William Magness)
- 6-4-85 Al Berndt asked about locating his gas engine at museum. Farm Equipment Club considered moving to Ag Museum.
- 7-29-85 Staked out windmill site
- 8-3-85 Windmill delivered
- 9-22-85 Well drilled 92 feet deep
- 11-5-85 ? Old Gas Engine Club
- 3-18-86 Bids buildings 4 - 5. 1st. 4-wheel lo-boy trailer acquired. Started 3rd building.
- 4-28-86 John Hodgkinson Sr. leveled sites for building. City of Union Gap asked to use trailer occasionally.
- 8-5-86 Equipment Club still interested in moving to museum site
- 1-26-87 George Hirahara donated 25 HP Fairbanks-Morse 1 cylinder engine.
- 2-23-87 Discussed getting stones from Cowiche Canyon school. Received courthouse bell.
- 3-3-87 Wilber Campbell staked out walking paths. Euclid Gamache donated courthouse bell.

- 4-87 Salvaged barn boards from stagecoach stop in upper Wenas. Worked with D.O.T. on directional signs. Memorial established "Bertha Farmer"
- 5-5-87 Discussed Chuck Ericksen building. Mentioned office building.
- 6-87 Got power poles from trolley. Ericksen building, Lila Miller building, Eschbach building. Established Tuesday as workday.
- 8-87 Lila Miller trust \$10,000. Lorene Petrie building.
- 8-4-87 Six buildings now completed. Sewer and water lines brought in.
- 9-15-87 Cascade electric to put 3-phase electricity to Miller building # 6
- 10-87 Union Gap school portable classroom available
- 1-88 Completed entry. Electricity installed in all 6 buildings.
- 3-88 Seeded lawn. Sprinkler system donated by Akland Irrigation. Centennial Project discussed.
- 8-88 Nob Hill Grange building. Moved Union Gap school modular. Now our permanent meeting room. Completed pathway.
- 11-88 Flagpole funded by County Centennial Committee \$500. Installed telephone, restrooms and kitchen in administration building. Asphalt pathway.
- 3-89 Magness donated \$3000.00 to start construction of display room for his tool collection. Gravel applied to pathways on hill. 2600 feet. Added water and telephone to administration building. Started on first display building in second circle. We may soon add buildings 8-9-10. Centennial funding for gazebo on hold.
- 7-89 Plumbing and electricity for restroom and kitchen. Magness tool room addition sheetrocked.
- 11-89 Union Gap Lions selected Ag Museum as their official home. Meeting 1st and 3rd. Mondays.
Dedicated Magness addition, kitchen, restroom which was funded in part by the Nob Hill Grange and Lions. Hillside pathways asphalted. Funded by issuing \$500.00 non-interest bearing, no maturity date notes. May try to relieve 2 a year. Emma Neumeister established an endowment in memory of her late husband Hank Neumeister.
Nature trails established.
- 4-90 We got listed in AAA 1990 tour book. Neumeister endowment \$3500. 00 donation. Evans Land Leveling developed parking east of administration building. Hosted (May 4) Washington Museum Association. Started storage building 30x60 and display garage (memorial for Craig Eschbach).
Building 8 Lorene Petrie. Dwight Hanson did survey of museum.
- 08-90 Eagle Scout project Clifford Bishop planted trees. Hosted meeting at Central Washington Museum.
- 08-91 Farm Equipment Club held show in Fullbright Park. Ted Falk memorial constructed by Arnold Thomas. Dedicated by Masonic Lodge. Gladys Uecker built building. RSVP thru November 30, 1991 - 15,444 miles, 5004 hours.

(The end of this document, but definitely NOT the end of the museum history)



Photos show the 40-foot windmill being assembled and installed at the museum in the summer of 1985. Purchased by Hank and Emma Neumeister in Rosalia, WA, the windmill was delivered on August 3 and placed over a 1,000-gallon tank, with a well drilled later.

70 TAKE A WALK THROUGH THE PAST AT THE CENTRAL WASHINGTON AGRICULTURAL MUSEUM

This is one of those hidden gems that after you see will make you wonder why it isn't talked about more. So I'm here to talk about it! The Central Washington Agricultural Museum is an outdoor collection of farming equipment. It is the largest agriculture museum in the Pacific Northwest and has a re-created old-town main street that shows what a small farm town center would have been like 100 years ago. The attention to detail is quite impressive, as you see when you peek in the doors and windows of old-timey shops and homes. Keep walking along the museum path and you'll come to what looks like an old warehouse but is open on one side to showcase exhibits about wagon travel and what farm life was like for women in the past. Continue your walk (or drive, it's open to cars) to the adjacent dirt field that has rows and rows of farm equipment of all types and more than 450 antique tractors. Each area of the museum has a QR code you can scan to listen to information about what you're viewing. As the granddaughter and niece of farmers, I found it all fascinating and wish I could have had my grandpa with me. The steward working at the museum was also friendly and helpful.
